Micturating Cystogram (Adults)

What is a Micturating Cystogram?

This is an examination of part of your urinary system (ie bladder and urethra) using x-rays and x-ray contrast (a clear liquid dye that shows up on x-ray pictures).

What is involved in the examination?

- When you arrive in the Diagnostic Imaging department, you will be asked to pass water to empty your bladder and change into a hospital gown
- In the x-ray room you will be catheterised by the radiologist performing the examination. This involves cleaning the genital area and passing a small soft tube called a catheter through the urethra and into the bladder. If you already have a catheter in place, we will use this instead
- During the examination, x-ray contrast is passed through the catheter into your bladder until it is full
- X-ray pictures are taken of your bladder
- The tube is then removed, and you will be asked to empty the dye from your bladder while more x-ray pictures are taken.

After the examination

- The x-ray contrast may leave you feeling sticky
- Passing water may burn a little for a day or two. You should drink plenty of fluids during this time
- Any irritation or soreness will subside
- Antibiotics may be given after the examination, if you are not already taking them, as a cover against infection.

Results

The report will be issued to your referring GP or Consultant team who will inform you of the next steps in your care pathway.
